VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT Spring Election – April 7, 2020

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing or online at MyVote.wi.gov

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter or you may apply for an absentee ballot online at MyVote.wi.gov. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application to your municipal clerk for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by fax, by email or at MyVote wi.gov.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is April 2, 2020

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person.





Why Now? Lower Taxes

If the referendum is approved, the school portion of taxes will go down by approximately \$0.40 per \$1,000 of equalized property value.

How can taxes go down? In 2020, the District will finish paying off the loan associated with building Dodgeland School in 2000. As a result, the debt portion of the school property tax bill will drop. This loan payment reduction gives the community the opportunity to re-invest in our school building to improve learning spaces, safety, and infrastructure with a reduction in taxes.



Community Survey

A district-wide survey, conducted last fall, indicated that the majority of all respondents would likely support an investment in Dodgeland schools up to \$20 million. The School Board carefully prioritized the most important projects for the referendum which total \$17 million.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF REESEVILLE February 13, 2020

A duly convened meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Reeseville, Dodge County, Wisconsin, was held in open session on February 13, 2020 and called to order by Village President, Brian Miller, at 6:30 p.m. The pledge of allegiance was recited. The following Trustees were present, Chris Abell, Chris Behymer, Cheryl Goodrich, Kerry Horton and Dave Snow. Trustee Jim Bublitz, was absent.

Notice of this meeting was given to the public at least 24 hours prior to the meeting by posting the complete agenda at the Reeseville Village Hall, the Reeseville Post Office, the Reeseville Public Library and on the Village's official website.

Jon Schrock, owner of Midwest General Repair and Fabrication, was present for public comments. Jon is interested in the demolition of his property at 106 Harrison Street and is looking for permission to do so. The Board stated that a permit from the building inspector was need to raise the existing house and garage. There was nothing further.

Greg Raube was also present for public comment and noted an issue with the snow removal at the intersection of Prairie Street and North Main Street. Dean Ziegel will contact the snow removal company.

The consent agenda was approved on a motion by Chris Behymer and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich. Motion carried. The consent agenda included approval of the general fund treasury report, the utility treasurer's report and the meeting minutes from the previous Board meeting.

Tammy Hampton and Don Netizel from Kunkel Engineering Group were present to give an Engineer's report. Tammy discussed funding scenarios for potential road repair projects, with Jackson Street, Park Avenue and Hickory Lane being top priority. The roads chosen were based on a funding opportunity which is uses job creation from Specialty Cheese's expansion. Specialty Cheese will potentially commit to creating thirty jobs. Deadlines are fast approaching to apply for grants and loans. The Board will need to make a decision at the March Board meeting. It's also possible that TIF 3 may be able to match the funds needed. A new Wastewater Treatment Agreement with Specialty Cheese will be prepared and presented at the March Board meeting. Dean Ziegel also noted a need to move Pearl Street up on the priority list, due to several water main breaks over the last couple of months. Tammy and Don will look into funding options and costs for repairs.

Police Chief Bahr was present to give the monthly police report. The report was reviewed by the Board. Chief Bahr discussed the hours worked, miscellaneous duties completed, patrol activity and citizen complaints/calls for service, for the month.

Fire Chief Gay was absent, there was no fire report for the month.

Discussion was had on the current fire inspection services. It was noted that the Fire Department is responsible for obtaining and contracting for inspection services. Discussion was tabled.

There was nothing to report on the First Responders. However, a monthly report from Lifestar EMS was reviewed.

Brief discussion was had regarding the Residence Board appeal hearing and decision. The hearing was to review a sex offender residency appeal. Chief Bahr was directed to contact the Village attorney on how to proceed.

Library Director Kay Kromm was absent; however, the January and February library reports were available for review. There was no further discussion.

Dean Ziegel noted that a pump went down on the Prairie Street lift station and discussion was had on whether to fix the broken pump or to replace it. Both pumps at this lift station are twenty years old. Two quotes from William/Reid were reviewed by the Board. It would cost \$4,662.00 to repair the pump or \$6,703.25 to replace it. Motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Dave Snow to purchase two new pumps, one to replace the broken pump and to keep the second as a backup. Motion carried.

Dean gave an update on the utilities. There was a water main break on Pearl Street and in the Reeseville Acres Mobile Home Park. The Specialty Cheese lift station had to be shut down and cleaned, due to excess unapproved waste that backed up the pumps. A vacant residential home had leak due to a garden hose that froze and broke open, however, Dean was able to correct the problem and stop any further water loss.

Dean also gave an update on the streets. We-Energies has the road torn up in front of BP to make repairs to their gas main and valves. The project should be completed by the end of February. The streets and sidewalks are in good condition. Dean commended the residents for keeping their sidewalks clear and salted and noted that the snow removal contractor is doing a good job on the streets.

An operator's license application for Marilyn Zietlow was reviewed by the Board. Motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich to approve the operator's license for Marilyn. Motion carried.

Brian Miller gave a brief update on the fire department's purchase of air packs. Financing was approved by the Reeseville Rural Town Group to purchase the new equipment. In order to obtain the financing each municipality of the Town Group had to approve the financing at their own meeting. Approval by the Village was not needed since the Village doesn't contribute to the Town Group funds. There was no further discussion.

Dave Snow discussed the current building code and an issue his committee encountered. Kunkel Engineering was looking over the current code and making suggestions to bring the code up to date, however, it was recently discovered that the code had been updated in 2002 and the building inspector had been using the wrong code. Discussion was had on whether the Village should/can update the Code of Ordinances and how this will affect the building code and if Kunkel should continue making suggested revisions. Discussion was postponed until later in the meeting.

There was nothing to report from the Public Property Committee.

Kerry Horton gave an update on the Community Center. The next fish fry is on February 14th, which is solely hosted by the Community Center. There will be another fish fry in March. A need for additional Community Center Board members was also noted.

There was nothing to report from the Recreation Department.

The Board discussed taking action on updating the Village Code of Ordinances. Motion by Dave Snow and seconded by Chris Abell to move forward, by obtaining quotes to revise the Code Book. Motion carried.

The property owner of 103 S. Main has an interested buyer who may want the property rezoned to residential from neighborhood business. A formal opinion could not be given until the owner applied for the rezoning and proper hearing was done. There was no further discussion.

Chris Abell is working on an ordinance to regulate electric sign usage. There was no further discussion.

The board discussed future agenda items.
