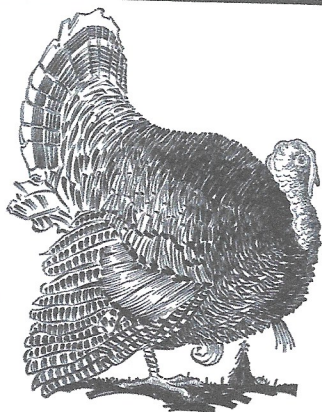

Village of Reeseville Housekeeping

The Village of Reeseville Board meetings are held on the 2nd Thursday of each month beginning at 6:30 p.m. Public comments are heard for the first 15 minutes of each meeting. Brush and Branch Pickup

Brush Pickup will continue on the first and third Mondays of each month

(weather permitting) and ending on November 16th. Branches can be a maximum of 4ft and must be tied together.

Leaf Pickup

Leaf Pickup will be done on Monday & Thursday each week (weather permitting) and ending on November 19th. Please pile leaves as close to the curb, without being in the street and avoid piling around trees, light posts, signs & vehicles. If vehicles are parked in front of the leaf piles, the Public Works Department will not be able to move around them and your property will be skipped.

Winter Snow Regulations

Street parking is prohibited 11/5-4/15 between 2am-6am. Tickets will be issued. Please also keep sidewalks clear of snow and salted. It is against village ordinance to purposefully dispense or move snow onto an adjoining property without the owners permission.

The 2020 General Election will be **November 3**. All absentee ballots must be returned to the Clerk no later than **8pm on election day**. Ballots may be returned through the mail or by hand in front of the Village Hall or directly to poll workers. The Village Clerk would like to remind all residents that they now need a photo ID to vote. If you have not voted in the last two years your voter registration may no longer be active and you may need to re-register. You can check your voter registration by go to <http://myvote.wi.gov/>.

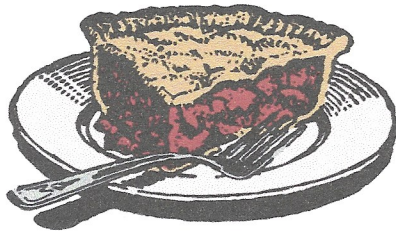

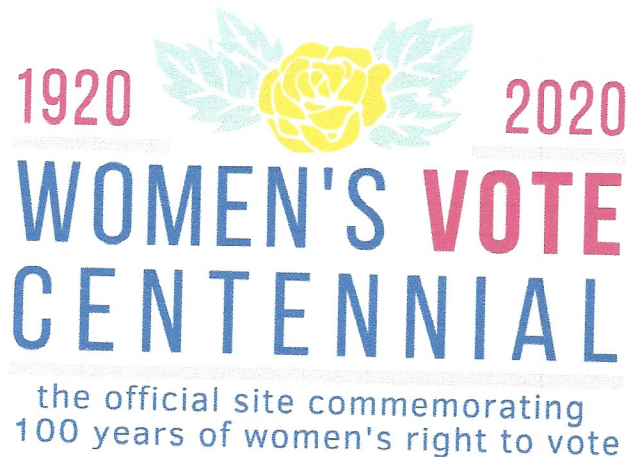
Window Into the Past
Womens' Vote Centennial

From 2019-2020, the US will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment and women's constitutional right to vote.

Suffragists began their organized fight for women's equality in 1848 when they demanded the right to vote during the first women's rights convention in Seneca Falls, New York. For the next 72 years, women leaders lobbied, marched, picketed, and protested for the right to the ballot. The U.S. House of Representatives finally approved the *Susan B. Anthony Amendment*, which guaranteed women the right to vote, on May 21, 1919. The U.S. Senate followed two weeks later, and the 19th Amendment went to the states, where it had to be ratified by 3/4ths of the-then-48 states to be added to the Constitution. By a vote of 50-47, Tennessee became the last state needed to ratify the 19th Amendment on August 18, 1920. Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby issued a proclamation declaring the 19th Amendment ratified and part of the US Constitution on August 26, 1920, forever protecting American women's right to vote.

Today, more than 68 million women vote in elections because of the courageous suffragists who never gave up the fight for equality. Explore the resources below to learn more about the story of the 19th Amendment and women's fight for the ballot.

**PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD
OF THE VILLAGE OF REESEVILLE
October 8, 2020**

A duly convened meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Reeseville, Dodge County, Wisconsin, was held in open session on October 8, 2020 and called to order by Village President, Brian Miller, at 6:33 p.m. The pledge of allegiance was recited. The following Trustees were present, Chris Abell, Jim Bublitz, Cheryl Goodrich and Dave Snow. Trustee Grant Rushing was absent and there is one vacant trustee seat.

Notice of this meeting was given to the public at least 24 hours prior to the meeting by posting the complete agenda at the Reeseville Village Hall, the Reeseville Post Office, and on the Village's official website.

Abigail Lowery was present for public comment, she is a candidate for State Assembly 37th District. She gave the following introduction and explained why she is running for office. She is currently a Deforest Village Trustee, stay at home mom and a former special education teacher. She will listen to the people and advocate for their priorities. Abigail has spoken with several local officials to get a better understanding of different municipalities priorities. She would like a fair nonpartisan process for redrawing district maps and to end Gerrymandering. Also, on her list of priorities is to expand broadband, especially in rural communities, increase grants or get the State directly involved in improving transportation infrastructure and more aid for rural communities. Abigail thanked the Village Board for their service and for what they do.

The consent agenda was approved on a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich. Motion carried. The consent agenda included approval of the general fund treasury report, the utility treasurer's report and meeting minutes from the previous Board meeting.

There was no Engineer's report for the month.

Police Chief Bahr was absent, but an update via email was reviewed by the Board. There was no further discussion.

Acting Assistant Chief Chris Abell gave a brief update on the Fire Department. They have added three new members and were awarded two grants to purchase rescue equipment and tools.

There was no First Responder report available. The Board reviewed the Lifestar EMS calls for the month. The Intergovernmental Agreement and sixth amendment to the Columbus Area Emergency Medical Services Group (CAEMS) was reviewed and approved on a motion by Dave Snow and seconded by Jim Bublitz. Motion carried.

The 2021 Dodge County 911 Joint Powers Agreement was approved on a motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich. Motion carried.

There was nothing to report from the Residence Board.

The September library report was reviewed by the Board. The capacity order was discussed by the Board. While governmental buildings in general are exempt from the mandate, the Board suggested that the library director use her discretion on how many patrons are allowed inside at one time and if it becomes a problem, further action will be taken by the Board.

Dean Ziegel gave an update on the utilities. The generators had their annual maintenance done. The lead and copper samples results came back, all were within normal limits.

Discussion was had on what to do with the old payment drop box because the Village of Lowell is interested in purchasing it. There was a motion by Cheryl Goodrich and seconded by Jim Bublitz to donate the old payment box to the Village of Lowell. Motion carried.

Dean also gave an update on the streets. Leaf pickup will begin soon, collection will be every Monday and Thursday until November 19th. The last day for brush and branch pickup will be November 16th.

The sale of the old DPW truck was tabled.

Discussion was had on the Secretary position for the Fire Commission. There is currently a vacancy and the Fire Commission would like direction on what to pay the new secretary. The Board recommended \$50 per meeting, the same as the commission members make. Christine Abell was asked if she would be interested in taking minutes and attending the meetings, there was no opposition. Brian Miller made a recommendation to have Christine Abell become the Secretary for the Fire Commission. Motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Dave Snow to appoint Christine Abell as Secretary, to be paid \$50 per meeting. Chris Abell abstained; motion carried.

Dave Snow gave the Public Health & Welfare Committee report and update. There was a dispute between a resident and Advanced Disposal during the last garbage collection. Dave has tried to follow up with Advanced Disposal, but he hasn't heard back from them. Dave also reached out to Badgerland Disposal for an update on our upcoming contract. They will be mailing an informational letter and calendar to all residents. An update was given on the property maintenance issues; the police department has made contact with three more residents. The code book legal analysis has been completed and the workbook is now available for the committee to review. There was nothing further to report.

There was no Public Property Committee report or update.

Cheryl Goodrich noted that the Community Center Board recently met and will be meeting again soon to discuss and propose the 2021 budget. There was nothing further.

There was no Recreation Department report or update.

The board discussed future agenda items.
