

Local Spotlight: Custom Taylored Carpentry







In histories of our state we read that long distances did not worry pioneers, for we are told that it was common for a farmer to drive to Milwaukee to have flour ground from his own grain. Perhaps it was the time when Mother asked to have several bolts of calico and bright taffeta brought home, for even in these days the lassies in the pioncer homes were stylishly dressed. We are told that seamstresses were often hired to stay at a farm for a week or two at a time and do enough sewing for the whole family to last a season or even a whole year. Turning the pages of an old family album reveals such feminine finery as laces, hoop skirts, bustles, three-quarter length sleeves, wasp waists and lovely cameos. Men's trousers were very narrow in width and tight-fitting coats were worn on the top of button closed vests.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF REESEVILLE June 10, 2021

A duly convened meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Reeseville, Dodge County, Wisconsin, was held in open session on June 10, 2021 and called to order by Village President, Brian Miller, at 6:31 p.m. The pledge of allegiance was recited. Roll call was taken and the following Trustees were present, Chris Abell, Jim Bublitz, Debby Casperson, Cheryl Goodrich, Grant Rushing and Dave Snow.

Notice of this meeting was given to the public at least 24 hours prior to the meeting by posting the complete agenda at the Reeseville Village Hall, the Reeseville Post Office, and on the Village's official website.

Mike Miescher and Pam Miescher were present for public comment. Mike received a call from a Village Board member inquiring about the load of top soil on his business property. He was notified that he needed to abide by the noise ordinance and to have erosion control with the soil. Mike noted that he had been done working by 8:00 p.m. which is before the noise ordinance goes into effect. Dave Snow had received a complaint from a resident on Jackson Street about the aforementioned. Mike and Pam noted that they have continual complaints and issues with the neighbors adjacent to their businesses (GJM Storage and Personality Plus) and feel like they are continually targeted and harassed. Unfortunately, the Village can't do anything regarding the harassment because it's considered a civil issue between the property owners. Pam Miescher also noted that the camper and trailer on their property are temporary and are being used by a construction foreman and a railroad inspector until the bridge on Bobolink is completed.

There was a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Debby Casperson to approve the consent agenda items, which include the minutes from the previous regular meeting, the citizen participation hearing, minutes from a special meeting, the Village Treasurer's report and Utility Treasurer's report. Motion carried.

Tammy Hampton from Kunkel Engineering was present to give the Engineer's Report. An update on the Pearl Street project was given. Don Neitzel was on-site with Brian Miller and Dean Ziegel to look over the construction progress. Rennhack Construction will begin pouring concrete for curb and gutter on Monday. Kartechner will be here at the end of next week to mill off any remaining asphalt pavement in the roadway. Kruczek will then adjust manholes and water valve boxes the week of June 21st. Fine grading of the street will take place after that and then asphalt pavement. Kruczek feels that paving and restoration should happen at the end of the month. The final completion date per the contract is August 27, 2021.

There was a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Debby Casperson to approve pay request #2 from Kruczek Construction, in the amount of \$110,267.64 Motion carried.

Resolution 2021-7 "Resolution Declaring Official Intent to Reimburse Expenditures from Proceeds of Borrowing" was presented for approval. Motion by Dave Snow and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich to adopt resolution 2021-7. Motion carried.

Resolution 2021-8 "Authorized Representative to File Application for Financial Assistance from State of Wisconsin Environmental Improvement Fund" was also presented for approval. Motion by Dave Snow and seconded by Jim Bublitz to adopt resolution 2021-8. Motion carried.

Police Chief Bahr was present and gave the montly police report. Chief Bahr went over the hours worked, citations issued, parking complaints and junk vehicle contacts. The Board asked for an update on the State Bank of Reeseville Knox Box. Chief Bahr will follow up with the bank. There was nothing further.

Fire Chief Abell gave the Fire Department report. There were two calls in May. BINGO will be held on Sunday. The Fire Department is working on plans for the annual Corn Roast on August 14th They plan on having chicken dinners, free corn and a band. The department may have one new member joining. The CLR Governing Committee convened for the first time and John Schmitt was appointed as President and Jerry Gaska was appointed as the Vice President. The Town Group met after the CLR Governing Committee and they approved additional repairs to the trucks.

Chris Abell also gave a brief update on the First Responders. The Lowell-Reeseville First Responders are still working well with the Clyman First Responders. The committee will meet on June 24th. The EMR class will be in Beaver Dam on Wednesdays starting August 25th – December 15th. The First Responders had training on the LUCAS device which was donated by Chet Caine. The First Responders also received a separate donation from The Refuge Church.

There was nothing to report from the Residence Board.

The May library report was reviewed by the Board. The building was recently power washed to get rid of the wasps and their nests. Jim Bublitz and Debby Casperson noted that there seems to be a lot of erosion near the basement wall outside. Jim offered to buy a gutter for the building to avoid water run off from creating a bigger problem.

Dean Ziegel gave an update on the utilities. Everything seems to be running well and water usage has increased. The 2020 Compliance Maintenance Annual Report was reviewed by the Board. The utility scored a 4.0 an "A". The Board thanked Dean for all of his hard work. Dean received a call and email from the DNR that lead and copper samples will not be required this year.

Resolution 2020-9 "Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources NR208 Compliance Maintenance Resolution. The 2021 Report; Reporting for the Year 2020" was reviewed by the board and approved on a motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Debby Casperson. Motion carried.

Dean had a quote from Wateress for \$3,845 per hydrant to refurbish the older hydrants. There is a concern that with the age of the hydrants, there's a potential for a main to break. Motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Dave Snow to approve the quote from Wateress. The motion was contingent on having one hydrant fixed first to see how the mains hold up before proceeding with the rest. Motion carried.

Dean and Brian Miller talked to Watertower Clean and Coat. They anticipate starting the week of July 12th, but may change if there's a drought. The tower will be drained for 2-3 days with lower water pressure while the tower is cleaned and the mixer is installed.

Dean Ziegel gave an update on the streets. Dean stated that a storm sewer on Ruby Street, one near Opal Avenue and one in front of the bank will be fixed. Asphalt was purchased to fill pot holes in May. Gary Kohn, Ben Zechzer and an employee of his, helped Dean fill the holes.

The following license applications were reviewed by the Board: Mobile home park licenses for Reeseville Associates LLC for a period of 7/01/2021-7/30/2021, Reeseville Acres MHC LLC for a period

of 8/01/2021-6/30/2022 and Sunny Creek Home LLC for a period of 7/01/2021-6/30/2022, were approved on a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Debby Casperson. Motion carried.

Class B Combination Licenses for Just 1 More LLC and the Reeseville Community Center for the period of 7/01/2021-6/30/2022, were approved on a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich. Motion carried.

A Combination Class A License for Sam's Amoco LLC for the period of 7/01/2021-6/30/2022 was approved on a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Debby Casperson. Motion carried.

A Cigarette License for Sam's Amoco LLC for the period of 7/01/2021-6/30/2022 was approved on a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded Grant Rushing. Motion carried.

Operator's Licenses for Bettina Goodhue, Matthew Keel, Benjamin Keel, Autim Erdman, Christine Raabe, Sandra Pocius, Ashley Gilbert, William Carey, Marilyn Zietlow and Rebecca Billington for the period of 7/01/2021- 6/30/2022 were approved on a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Debby Casperson. Motion carried.

Dave Snow and Chief Bahr discussed property maintenance issues. Chief Bahr was instructed to give property owners 30 days to comply and to start writing citations if they don't.

Christine Abell gave an update on the Code Book. The workbook has been converted into a digital copy to be sent off to General Code. During the conversion there were a couple of questions that were missed in the workbook and a couple that needed clarification. Once clarification is received, the completed digital copy will be sent to General Code for the next steps.

Debby Casperson presented an email from Sara Hanna regarding a Coach Pitch Tournament she would like to do as a fundraiser for a little boy with Leukemia. Sara would like full use of the park, diamonds and bathrooms on July 23rd & 24th. She will work up the fields to get them ready using the equipment left over from the baseball association. Discussion was had. Since the baseball association notified the Village that there would not be teams this year, Dean had not turned the water back on at the diamonds. The water is not easy to turn on and Dean would also need to de-winterize the bathrooms. The Board discussed the additional costs that the Village would incur, including Dean's time/wages, additional mowing, additional electricity use, water usage and septic tank pumping. There was a motion by Jim Bublitz seconded by Debby Casperson to allow Sara to use the baseball diamonds, but water and bathrooms would not be available. A \$100 fee will be required to help cover the additional costs and \$150 would be required as a security deposit, which will be returned after the tournament, unless there is damage or excessive cleaning needed. Motion carried.

The Board discussed lawn mower quotes. Dean Ziegel recommended the quote from Powersports for a 2021 Scag Tiger Cat for \$9,521.00. Since the mower is also used at the lift stations, well houses and water tower property, the Scag will be paid in thirds by the water utility, sewer utility and the village general fund. There was a motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Jim Bublitz to approve the Powersports quote for \$9,521.00. A roll call vote was taken: Chris Abell -yes, Jim Bublitz -yes, Debby Casperson -yes, Cheryl Goodrich -yes, Grant Rushing -yes, Dave Snow -yes and Brian Miller -yes. Motion carried (7 -yes, 0 -no).

There are issues with the seal coating in the library driveway and parking lot. The seal coating still hasn't hardened and is creating a sticky mess. Jim Bublitz contacted Scott's Construction and they had recommended mixing the seal coat with sand or lime chips. Both recommendations have been tried without luck. The Board asked Jim to have Scott's Construction come back and fix it. There was no further discussion.

An update was given on the baseball property ownership issue. Mr. Hookstead has signed the deed transfer and it has been sent in for recording. There was no further discussion.

There was nothing to report from the Community Center.

Appointment to the Board of Appeals was tabled.

Appointment to the Community Center Board was tabled.

President Brian Miller appointed Cheryl Goodrich as Board liaison to the Community Center Board for a 1-year term. Motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Jim Bublitz to accept the appointment. Motion carried.

Appointment to the Recreation Board will be tabled until further notice.

The board discussed future agenda items.
