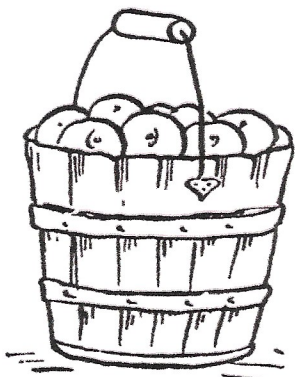

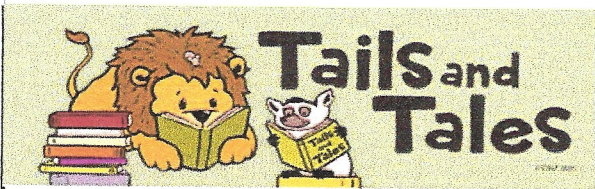

Summer reading finished up in July. Turn in your completed reading log and choose your prize.

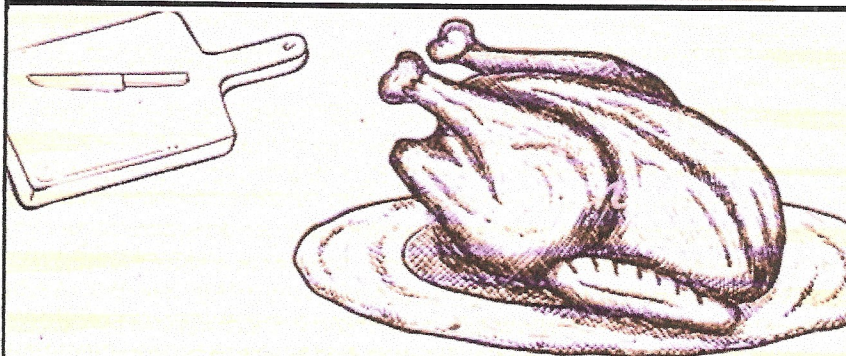
We are bringing Story Time back this September. The library will host a program with stories, crafts and snacks at the Fireman's Park. Please check our website for times and dates.

The Reeseville Library Board wants to encourage use by forgiving fines. If you have library fines that are keeping you from using the library please contact the director to make arrangements.

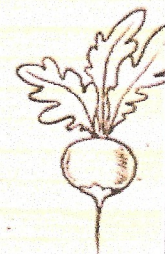
## Window Into the Past

**PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD  
OF THE VILLAGE OF REESEVILLE  
August 12, 2021**

A duly convened meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Reeseville, Dodge County, Wisconsin, was held in open session on July 8, 2021 and called to order by Village President, Brian Miller, at 6:30 p.m. The pledge of allegiance was recited. Roll call was taken and the following Trustees were present, Chris Abell, Jim Bublitz, Debby Casperson, Cheryl Goodrich, Grant Rushing and Dave Snow.

Notice of this meeting was given to the public at least 48 hours prior to the meeting by posting the complete agenda at the Reeseville Village Hall, the Reeseville Post Office, and on the Village's official website.

There were three village residents present for public comment. Roy Holloway was present and thanked the Village for their help while he replaced his water service. There were issues with the curb-stop and connection. Mr. Holloway paid for the repairs and turned in the invoices to be reimbursed by the Water Utility.

There were two other residents from Garnet Circle whom were present to express concerns over the landscaping problems with the Pearl Street project. Their concerns included topsoil issues, weeds and the property not being restored to it's original appearance.

There was a motion by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Debby Casperson to approve the consent agenda items, which include the minutes from the previous regular meeting, minutes from the police hearing, the Village Treasurer's report and Utility Treasurer's report. Motion carried.

Tammy Hampton from Kunkel Engineering was present to give the Engineer's Report. An update was given on the Pearl Street Project. There is a one-year warranty on the work and landscaping starting after the final payment is made. The inspector went over the punch list with Dean. Don Neitzel will follow up with Dean on the landscaping. Kruczek's have come through and took out the barricades and pulled weeds. For the most part, the project is done. They will be back to do some finishing touches.

Kruczek's did not submit a pay request and it's anticipated that will submit the final pay request in September.

An update on the CDBG grant for the Jackson Street project was given. The Village was not awarded the grant. Tammy discussed the points awarded. The Village received 135 points and the lowest score awarded funds had a score of 155. Discussion was had on how to improve the score in the future. Not having water or sewer utility project decreases our score by 14-30 points which would have been the difference in receiving the grant. Tammy asked the Board and Dean to brainstorm ideas to include any possible water and/or sewer projects to tie in with the Jackson Street project.

Chief Bahr was present to give the police report. The report included the hours worked, citations issued, citizen complaints and calls for service. There was nothing further.

Chief Abell was present to give the fire report. There were seven calls for the month. A merger meeting was had and things are progressing. The corn roast is this Saturday (August 14<sup>th</sup>).

Chief Abell also gave an update on the First Responders. The majority of their membership want to be a part of the merger and have stated so at the recent merger meeting. They are still working with Clyman First Responders and running auto aid.

Resolution 2021-10 "Resolution Authorizing the Merger of the Lowell-Reeseville First Responders and the CLR Fire & Rescue" was presented for approval. The resolution states approval of the merger and allowing the dissolution of the First Responder Committee when applicable. There was a motion by Grant Rushing and seconded by Jim Bublitz to adopt the resolution. Motion carried.

There was nothing to report from the Residence Board.

The monthly library report and a memo from Monarch regarding the wifi was reviewed by the Board. Monarch made some changes to the wifi channel frequencies and it seems to be working. It was noted that the wifi is being shut off after 9pm and it was suggested that they turn it back on full time and will reevaluate after a month. Dean Ziegel reported that the library's air conditioner broke and they are working on repairs.

Dean also gave an update on the utilities. There was a private lateral leak and it now has been fixed and the lead service replaced. The DNR came out and did a three-year water inspection. The water tower has been cleaned inside and out, repairs have been done and the mixer installed. The MSABP blower recently went down and has been repaired. There was an issue with a resident's water service on S. Main Street and has been resolved. Hydrant repairs have been started. A hydrant on Dewey and Garfield was upgraded and things went well. Parts for the other five hydrants to be upgraded, have been ordered. Dean went over the DNR water inspection report. There were two deficiencies outlined that need to be addressed by the end of the year. The DNR also made recommendations for the Board to consider.

An update on the streets was given. Pearl Street, Emerald Drive and Garnet Circle have been paved and the project nearly complete. Gary Kohn and Dean Ziegel restriped the parking stalls on the South side of Park Ave.

Discussion was had on "No Jake Brake" signage for N. Main Street. It was also suggested to prohibit Jake Braking within Village limits. The Streets and Alleys committee will meet to discuss and recommend an ordinance and signage.

There was no update on property maintenance. The Public Health & Welfare Committee will meet to discuss driveways and parking on lawns.

Ordinance A-133 "An Ordinance Recreating Sec. 6-2-8 "Terrace Areas" of the Municipal Code was presented to the Board. The ordinance covers maintenance of terraces. There was a motion by Dave Snow and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich to adopt Ordinance A-133. Motion carried.

A resident reached out to Debby Casperson to talk about the condition of Firemen's Park. The park is starting to look run down and the playground could use some maintenance. Weeds along the creek are growing out of control and weeds need to be removed from the basketball court. There was a concern of overgrowth covering the park's sign, especially with the corn roast coming up. Debby and Dean Ziegel have since taken care of that. There were also concerns regarding the state of the ball diamonds and dug outs. The resident is interested in starting up the Recreation Department again. Debby was going to follow up with her and there was no further discussion.

Cheryl Goodrich gave a brief report on the Community Center. They will be having a bake sale at the corn roast. She was recently approached by someone about the lack of reservations at the center and

concerns about the Community Center's Board members putting up their funds in effort to support the center. Ideas have been brainstormed about how to occupy the building during the week and bring in more income. There was no further discussion.

There was no Recreation Department update or report.

President Brian Miller made the following appointment recommendations; Roy Holloway and Ken Leistico to the Board of Appeals for a three-year term. There was a motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Dave Snow to approve the appointments. Motion carried.

Appointment to the Community Center Board for a two-year term was tabled.

The board discussed future agenda items.

There was a motion by Dave Snow and seconded by Cheryl Goodrich that the bills be approved and the Clerk-Treasurer be instructed to draw orders for the same. Motion carried.

An audit services proposal from Huberty was presented to the Board. The current accountant has retired and the Village needs to find a replacement. Huberty was recommended to the Clerk-Treasurer by the former accountant. The water and sewer audits were estimated at \$12,600 each and the PSC report would be an additional \$2,850. TIF auditing services were also offered for \$1,500-\$2,500. There was a motion by Dave Snow and seconded by Chris Abell to approve the Huberty proposal. Motion carried.

Discussion was had on creating an office for the Clerk-Treasurer. Currently she works out of her home and needs a place to expand. The Clerk-Treasurer would also like to offer in person hours, especially during tax collection. It was suggested that the current police office could be big enough to share. Chief Bahr had no objections and he will meet with her to figure out the details.

Brief discussion was had on wages for the Village President, Board Trustees and part-time DPW employees. The Finance & Personnel Committee will meet and make a recommendation for budget planning. A closed session was not called.

There was a motion by Chris Abell and seconded by Debby Casperson to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:49 p.m.
