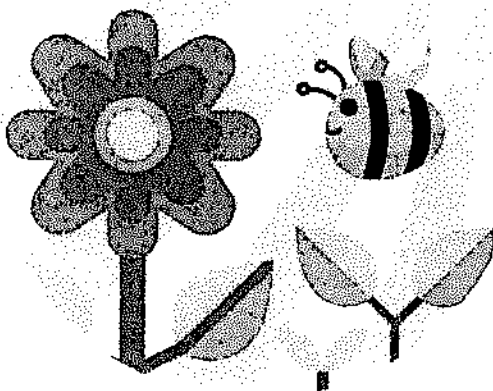
Sunday School for children ages 4 through 8 TH Grade meet from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

**PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD  
OF THE VILLAGE OF REESEVILLE  
April 13, 2023**

A duly convened meeting of the Village Board of the Village of Reeseville, Dodge County, Wisconsin, was held in open session on April 13, 2023, and called to order by Village President, Brian Miller, at 6:30pm. The pledge of allegiance was recited. Roll call was taken and the following Trustees were present, Jim Bublitz, Cheryl Goodrich, Dave Snow, Anna Volkova, Kevin Hanks Jacob Pacala.

Notice of the meeting was given to the public at least 48 hours prior to the meeting by posting the complete agenda at the Reeseville Village Hall, the Reeseville Post Office.

Jim Bublitz made a motion to approve the consent agenda, along with the minutes of the previous board meeting and the treasurer and utility reports, the motion was seconded by Anna Volkova, motion carried.

Jim Bublitz made a motion to appoint Jacob Pacala to the vacant position on the village board, and the motion was seconded by Kevin Hanks, motion carried.

Public input, Sam Ackerly presented the board with concerns of a dog on N. Main Street who was unleashed and attacked another dog, and the pet owner of the dog that was attacked broke the 2 dogs up and got bit. A police report was filed. Sam wanted to know what was going to be done regarding this issue. Sam expressed concerns for public safety and stated this isn't the first time this dog has been unleashed and caused problems. Officer Nicholas confirmed a report was filed. The village board committee will hold a committee meeting to address this issue and report back to the board next month. Josh Braun asked if brush would be picked up from the curb, and the board informed him no, but on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays of the month brush may be take out to burn pile as long as you provide proof that you are a resident of the village, Joesph Wagner is the brush pile attendant who will be on site assisting residents.

Tammy Hampton from Kunkel Engineering group was present to update the board on a final pay request for the Jackson Street project will be presented at May board meeting. Dave Snow asked Tammy about landscaping that needs to be fixed from this project, Tammy stated she will let Don Neitzel know, and make LaLonde Construction aware of this also. The county will be doing the painting of the lines on Jackson Street as soon as weather permits. Tammy said Don Neitzel needs to meet with Dean regarding chlorination building, and Basol is working on finalizing the DNR report. Tammy talked about the project on Dewey and Garfield streets, Garfield Street to replace the sanitary system, in October file for project funding. Dave suggested about fixing sidewalks with the next project on Garfield. The board discussed PSC lead services that would have to be replaced at the time of construction, Tammy will get more information on this for the board.

Jim Bublitz made a motion to move to item 11 under section E, the motion was seconded by Dave Snow, motion carried. Donna Braun from Dodge County was present to speak about the proposed daycare center. Donna gave a brief update on the daycare center plans and in February the village was sent notification regarding blueprints with the daycare center on, which raised concerns for the village board. President Brian Miller stated when the village board approved for the 10-unit housing, there was never anything mentioned about the daycare center. Brian stated the daycare center is important. Paul Scharfman plans never communicated a daycare, and the way things were handled, the bad location for the daycare, this is not acceptable. The village will be holding a PUD committee meeting to meet with Donna Braun to discuss the issue regarding the daycare, on May 1, 2023, at 5:00pm.

Officer Nicholas gave the police report total 69 incidents, and total non-contact incidents were 33. Officer Nicholas emailed the officers that work in the village to follow thru with the recent, complaint regarding the dog on N Main Street.

CLR report, the fire department is looking to get rid of old lights, light bars, old hoses, steel air tanks (not in use), they will also talk to John Schmitt before discarding these items. No report was available at the time of meeting from Lifestar.

Kay Kromm (Library Director) gave the library report, one employee was terminated, and locks were changed. Kay stated she is having trouble finding employees, the library is closed on Saturdays for now. Kay is hoping to compensate her employee wages to see if that may bring more interest in employment for the library. The village currently appropriates \$29,500.00 in funding to the library.

Utility Report, Dean stated he sent water samples in on the 8<sup>th</sup> and the state got them on the 13<sup>th</sup>, Dean has never had a problem with samples arriving late before. The pump on prairie street has quit working, got a new one and it was installed. We had a lateral break on the 16<sup>th</sup> on North main and repaired it. 4 hydrants were replaced. Cement work on Washington and North Main and a driveway needs to be fixed after the repairs from lateral. Dean informed the board that Darrell Kromm who has worked for the village for over 30 years will be retiring when Dean retires. The board thanked Darrell Kromm for his many years of dedicated service. Dean will present the board with Darrell's letter of retirement.

Dean reported on March 21, 2023, the county filed the potholes in the village. Dodge County Highway Dept. will be doing the painting of lines on Jackson Street for \$1,400.00. The streets will be cleaned, Watertown will call a couple weeks ahead before they come out.

Finance and Personal report, the committee had a meeting with candidates for the DPW replacement, Kenneth Hanks expressed interest in the position and the committee interviewed Kenneth. Dave Snow made a motion to hire Kenneth Hanks as the new DPW employee to replace Dean Ziegel who is retiring, the motion was seconded by Jim Bublitz, motion carried with Kevin Hanks abstaining from voting.

Clerk update report, the auditors are finishing up on the water and sewer audit and will finish the general fund after completing the water and sewer. Election update was given President Brian Miller was re-elected along with village trustees Cheryl Goodrich, Dave Snow, and Jim Bublitz. We need to get lawn mowing bids for the season, Jim Bublitz made a motion to give the committee permission to sign a contract for mowing, the motion was seconded by Kevin Hanks, motion carried.

Community Center report, Cheryl Goodrich said bingo went well, food sales were down but may have been because of Easter. April there were 3 bookings, May has 5 bookings, and June has 3 bookings.

Rec Dept. report, Anna Volkova is working on getting quotes for new playground equipment with the \$50,000 Watertown Health Foundation Grant, and Anna will be looking into additional funding from outside sources if any is available.

The board discussed future agenda items.

A motion to approve paying the bills was made by Kevin Hanks and seconded by Jim Bublitz, motion carried.

A motion to adjourn was made by Jim Bublitz and seconded by Anna Volkova, motion carried.
